# Huth/Keller Heritage by Marty Johnson (9)

Part III continues stories of our heritage. In this story the information is based on Marty's research and to the best of our knowledge is true.

Part III. Henry and Lauretta's Early Years: Despite their difference in age, Henry courted Laura until after she turned 16, when they married on January 29th, 1913 at St. Joseph's Church. After the wedding, they moved into his oldest sister Rosa's house where they lived for less than a year. They then moved to Tallmadge where they lived on Henry Bierce's farm.

Their first child, Pauline Mary was born July 9, 1914 in a farmhouse on Rt. 18 in Tallmadge. The labor was difficult. Pauline weighed ten pounds at birth. Lauretta was told that she would probably not have any more children. They went on to have eleven more.

In preparation for winter with a newborn, Henry walked to Akron to buy a pot-bellied stove. He returned to Tallmadge with it on his back.

They moved back to Hartville the next year, where their first son Gilbert was born. Life was hard, but relatively happy. A few days before Pauline's second birthday however, she managed to get a large kernel of dried corn lodged in her windpipe. Lauretta frantically hitched up a horse and buggy and together with Pauline and Gilbert raced out to the fields to get Henry. He took the choking Pauline to the country doctor who regretfully informed Henry that there was nothing he could do. The doctor advised him to take the baby home to die in the comfort of her mother's arms.

Upon hearing of the child's plight, another patient waiting in the doctor's home urged Henry not to listen to the doctor. She suggested that perhaps something could be done at St. Luke's Hospital in Cleveland. She said that a train was scheduled to leave shortly and that she would make arrangements with her husband who was the station master. They took the train, and upon arrival in Cleveland, the conductor led Henry to a waiting horse drawn coach. With a mounted police escort, they were rushed to St. Luke's.

Pauline was examined and Henry was told that no one in the hospital could remove the blockage. However, they were attempting to contact a surgeon in New York who might be able to help. For nearly two weeks they waited. Pauline gasped for air, struggled for oxygen, and fought hard to survive. Henry was left with little to do but hope and pray.

The surgeon finally arrived, examined her, and fashioned an instrument to dislodge the kernel. After several unsuccessful attempts, he finally removed the blockage and saved her life.

A tired but grateful father and daughter headed back home to Hartville. The time away from the fields had taken a heavy toll. With no help on the farm, they lost their onion crop that season their primary source of income. They harvested their only other crop, celery, and decided then to leave farming.

They moved to Massilon, where Henry got a job driving a delivery truck for the Atlantic Tea Company. Henry and Lauretta lived in Massilon for three years before they moved to the Wirth Avenue house in Ellet in 1918.
