GREEN — Project REBUILD Canton received \$7,500 from the Henry and Laura Huth Charitable Foundation, of Copley, at the foundation's 24th annual Huth invitational Golf Benefit July 17 at Chenoweth Country Club.

Foundation trustee and golf benefit organizer Lon Johnson, shown above, at left, presented the check to Project REBUILD secretary-treasurer Chris Holding, who also is a senior vice president for TimkenSteel.

More than 100 members of the business and professional communities of Summit and Stark counties participated in the fundraiser, according to foundation officials. An affiliate of YouthBuild USA, the nonprofit Project REBUILD gives young people ages 16 to 24 the opportunity to obtain a high school diploma or GED and become 10b ready, according to

foundation officials. Those enrolled in the program construct and rehabilitate affordable housing for low- and moderate-income individuals and families.

The foundation has donated more than \$54,000 to Project REBUILD, said officials. Program participants related personal stories and the impact Project REBUILD has had on their lives to those attending the benefit, officials said. The children and families of Henry and Laura Huth created the foundation to continue the Huths' legacy of caring for and encouraging children and youth who need guidance, education and support and enabling them to fulfill dreams and become productive citizens, according to foundation officials.

Former restaurant owner recalls fighting to survive in man's world

Marian Huth Holibaugh accom-plished two feats many

plished two feats many people do not achieve: She celebrated her 95th birthday in July, and she had three birthday parties to mark the occasion.

With her constant smile and laughter, Holibaugh radiates beauty, health, happiness and the youth of a woman half her age. She still lives by herself, maintains her home and maintains her home and maintains her home and keeps up on the news. It's clear that while 95 years may have slowed Holibaugh down a bit, they have by no means stopped her. Holibaugh chose her

Holibaugh chose her teen years as the start-ing point for talking through the journey of her life. She recalled growing up as fourth in a line of five girls and seven boys. Her family lived in Elliot, the southeast side of Akron. Akron.

There were many ups and downs throughout Holibaugh's youth, but Holibaugh's youth, but she loved growing up with a big family. "Peo-ple tell me, '12 kids... you must have had a miserable life,'" said

the only Catholic fami-lies in the area, and at the time the Ku Klux lies in the area, and at the time the Ku Klux Klan was very active in their campaign against Catholics. Holibaugh remembers crosses burning in their front yard and rocks being thrown through their windows. She also remembers how her father, a "spunky man," would run out into the yard and try to rip the costumes off of the KKK members.

Holibaugh described her parents as good people, but said they were very strict. Holibaugh talked about how she didn't perform her weekly chore of washing the windows once and her mother grounded her from her senior prom.

While those restraints may seem harsh, especially missing her senior prom, they proved to be quite effective. Holibaugh and her siblings all grew up to be successful men and women. Over the years, many former employees have told Holibaugh that working at Chicken Manor was one of the best experiences of their lives
